Steward

A Steward [oikonomos (oy-kon-om'-os)] is diakonos (dee-ak'-on-os) which means servant and is also by definition episkope (ep-is-kop-ay') which means manager and one put into service to look after and tend to the affairs of his master. The term diakonos has been translated as deacon six times in Scripture and is not to be seen as a singular office but as a category or class of multiple offices for which all shepherds occupy. The same is true for episkope. Please see the study on Church: Forms and Practices for a fuller study on this and other key points of Scripture.
